Notes: Originally the home of Jonathan and Barbara Hildner, who was a UM Professor of German. By the early 1920s this house was the residence of locally prominent lawyer Roscoe O. Bonisteel. Serving as Regent of the University of Michigan from 1946-59, Bonisteel was a key supporter of the acquisition and development of the North Campus. He also was President of the State Bar of Michigan, and served as a delegate to the Michigan Constitutional Convention. In 1972, the Regents named the primary street on the North Campus Bonisteel Boulevard in honor of the late Regent Emeritus.

Appointed Assistant Director of the Pathological Labs in 1924, he became Director in 1931, and was made Chairman of the Department of Pathology in 1938. Weller himself built the stone wall at his house. In 1956, the Michigan Pathological Society named a lecture in his honor, and the first Weller lecture was delivered only two days before his death.







In 1922 Ruthven was named Director of the University Museums, and in 1926 he became Chairman of the Department of Zoology and Dean of Administration. From 1929 to 1951, Dr. Ruthven served as the seventh President of the University of Michigan. In 1968 the Regents named the University's natural history museum in honor of President Ruthven.
