Significant Criminal Events for January 3, – 26, 2008

Armed Bank Robbery

3500 Plymouth Rd

1-3-08 (Days)

The Chase Bank at 3500 Plymouth was robbed. The teller advised that the suspect came into the bank through the front doors, wrote something down, and got into line. When the suspect got to her window, he passed her the note. Then told her what he wanted. The teller advised she opened her drawer and started giving him money. It is believed this suspect is also involved in Bank Robberies in the Lansing, Jackson and Flint areas.

SUSPECT ARRESTED

Unarmed Robbery

2100 W. Stadium Blvd

1-3-07 (Afternoons)

Officers were dispatched to Arbor Farms Market, reference a purse snatching. The victim advised that she drove to the Arbor Farms Market, parked her truck, and began to walk to the entrance at which time the three suspects approached her and grabbed her purse. The victim fell to the ground and tried to hold onto her purse straps, but eventually let it go. The suspects fled at that time.

Homicide/Armed Robbery

1500 Jones Dr

1-16-08 (Midnights)

Officers were dispatched to 1500 Block of Jones Drive, reference a homicide. The suspects heard there were narcotics inside the residence and when they broke into the residence, the owner opened fire on the suspects killing one. The Ann Arbor Police department is still looking for one suspect in the Armed Robbery.

Larceny from Vehicle

1300 W. Stadium Blvd

1-20-08 (Midnights)

Officers were dispatched to W. Stadium, reference a larceny from auto. The suspect broke out the driver's window, reached inside, and took a GPS unit that was attached

The (CERT) Program educates people about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster response skills. Using the training learned in the classroom and during exercises, CERT members can assist others in their neighborhood or workplace following an event when professional responders are not immediately available to help. CERT members also are encouraged to support emergency response agencies by taking a more active role in emergency preparedness projects in their community.

To become a CERT member, you will have to take the CERT training. Applications for Washtenaw County residents are now being accepted at the Ann Arbor Police Department or on the Police webpage.

This training course will run every Thursday night from March 27th to May 8th, from 6:30 – 9:30 pm with the final exercise and graduation on the morning May 17th. The course is a combination of classroom sessions and hands-on training in scene assessment, fire safety, emergency medical response, team organization, disaster medical operations, and light search and rescue. The course will also provide information on topics such as, local threats, hazards, county and city emergency management initiatives and incident command and terrorism.

Attendance at all classes is required for certificate of completion.

The C.E.R.T. Training Course Application deadline is Friday, February 15, 2008 at 5:00 pm at the Ann Arbor Police Department. All applicants agree to a background investigation and will be notified if they have been accepted into the course. Seating is limited, so please submit your application as early as possible.

What is CERT?

(CERT) is a concept developed in 1985 by the Los Angeles Fire Department. They recognized that citizens would very likely be on their own during the first few hours after a catastrophic disaster.

The LAFD created CERT to help provide vital services in the absence of emergency responders. Today, more than 38 states and several foreign countries have instituted the CERT program in their local communities.

The events of September 11, 2001 will never be forgotten, also not forgotten is how the spirit of America was awakened that day and citizens came forth to volunteer their services. President George W. Bush harnessed this spirit of volunteerism with the creation of the Citizens Corps program. CERT is one facet of the Citizens Corps program.

Course Overview

Classes are taught by emergency responders, including law enforcement, firefighters and emergency medical personnel from Washtenaw County. The course includes the following lessons:

Emergency Medical Response

Medical first response including certification in first aid, C.P.R. and use of the automated external defibrillator (AED).

Disaster Preparedness

Introduction to disasters specific to Washtenaw County, and the impact of disaster on infrastructure.

Disaster Medical Operations

Treatment strategies for life threatening conditions and principles of triage. Patient assessment and treatment for various injuries.

Search & Rescue Operations

Techniques for sizing up and searching, lifting, cribbing and removing victims; rescuer safety.

Disaster Psychology & Team Organization

The post-disaster emotional environment will be discussed. CERT organization, decision making and documentation.

Terrorism

A brief overview of terrorism and the weapons they use. Identifying targets in Washtenaw County and discussion of time/distance/shielding.

Final Exercise

Disaster simulation realistic to Washtenaw County.

CERT Training will teach participants to:

- ◆ Describe the types of hazards most likely to affect their homes and communities.
- ◆ Describe the function of CERT and their roles during a disaster.
- ◆ Take steps to prepare themselves and their families for a disaster.
- ◆ Identify and reduce potential fire hazards in their home and workplace.
- ◆ Work as a team to apply basic fire suppression strategies, resource and safety measures tri extinguish a burning liquid.
- ◆ Apply techniques for opening airways, controlling bleeding and treating shock.
- ◆ Conduct triage under simulated conditions.
- ◆ Perform head-to-toe assessments.
- ◆ Select and set up a treatment area.
- ◆ Employ basic treatments of injuries
- ◆ Identify planning and size-up requirements for potential search and rescue operations.
- ◆ Describe the most common techniques for searching a structure.
- ◆ Use safe techniques for debris removal and victim extrication.
- ◆ Describe ways to protect rescuers during search and rescue operations.

How Can I Join?

To become a CERT member you must be at least 18 years of age and possess a valid driver's license. You must complete all the requirements for the training course and want to be part of a very special team. If you want to volunteer your services and become trained to protect yourself and families from disasters; natural or man-made.
