Safety Update Holiday Season Safety Tips

The holiday season brings joy and celebrations, but it's also a time to prioritize safety. Here are some tips to sleigh through the season safely.

Drink Responsibly – If you are indulging in holiday spirits, have a designated driver or a plan for safe transportation to get back to your gingerbread house.

Stay Healthy – Being sick over the holidays is no fun. Make sure to practice good hand hygiene, cover your cough and sneeze, and be cautious attending gatherings if you are not feeling well. It's not too late to order free COVID-19 tests (four tests per household) which you can request by visiting COVIDTests.gov.

Home Safety - Keep your home safe and secure by locking doors and windows when you're away. Avoid posting specific holiday plans on social media to prevent advertising an empty house. No need to invite the Grinch while you are away.

Travel Safety - If traveling through winter wonderlands, plan ahead, check road conditions, ensure your vehicle and tires are in good condition and have emergency kit with supplies. Stay updated on weather forecasts and road closures.

Fire Safety - Be cautious with decorations, lights, and candles. Keep flammable materials away from heat sources, never leave candles unattended and if you have a live tree, make sure it gets plenty of water!

Mental Well-being - The holidays can be stressful, so take some time self-care and reach out for support if needed. Prioritize mental health as much as physical safety.

Emergency Preparedness - Familiarize yourself with emergency contacts and have a plan in case of unexpected situations. Know where to seek help if needed.

Ann Arbor Shares Christmas Tree Drop-off Locations and Composting Updates. The City of Ann Arbor regular, seasonal curbside composting pickups concluded Friday, Dec. 15, 2023. In 2024, the city will once again offer winter pickup of compost carts as part of the monthly winter composting program. Compost cart pickups will take place the weeks of Jan. 8, Feb. 5, and March 4, 2024. More information is also available via https://www.a2gov.org/news/pages/article.aspx?i=1019

Please keep the following guidance in mind to help prevent material from freezing to carts:

- Drain as much liquid as possible from food scraps.
- Place an opened paper yard-waste bag inside the compost cart to hold the food scraps or yard material.
- Put pieces of flattened cardboard (one—two large pizza boxes are perfect) at the bottom of the compost cart before adding produce. This buffer at the bottom of the cart allows the materials to slide out more easily and not freeze to the cart.
- To keep the compost cart from getting messy, wrap drippy, wet items (e.g., coffee grounds, melon rinds) in one—two sheets of compostable paper towels before putting into the compost cart.
- If material is frozen to the cart when the city attempts service, it won't be serviced again until the following month.
- Use bungee cords to thwart clever raccoons; remember to remove them at the curb.
- Rinse out carts, if temperatures allow, with non-toxic soap and water and empty onto your grass or gravel, never down the storm drain.

Ann Arbor Shares Information to Prepare for Winter Weather. Severe winter weather poses health and safety concerns with extremely cold temperatures, dangerous travel conditions, freezing pipes, potential propane shortages and power outages. City of Ann Arbor is sharing important information regarding emergency alerts as well as ways to prepare for what winter may bring from the Michigan State Police MIREADY program.

- Sign up now for <u>emergency alerts</u> from the City of Ann Arbor, via Everbridge, to be notified in the event of a weather-related or any other emergency.
- Washtenaw County residents should be aware of the winter-weather condition categories as set by Washtenaw County, and the accompanying actions necessary.
 - o Red: Extremely hazardous driving conditions exist on major highways and roads with heavy snow and/or ice, severe drifting and/or extremely limited visibility. Motorists are urged not to drive.
 - Yellow: Very hazardous driving conditions exist with heavy snow, ice, drifting or limited visibility.
 Motorists are urged if they must drive, use extreme care, and allow for significant drive time.

- Warning: Hazardous weather has arrived and poses a threat to life or property. Take protective action.
- o Advisory: Hazardous weather is imminent or likely.
- Watch: The risk of hazardous weather has increased but occurrence, location or timing is uncertain.
