



The Patrol section is led by Lieutenants Brandon Knobelsdorf and A/LT. Andrew Janette.










The patrol section is tasked with community engagement, problem solving, and providing the initial response to all calls for service. Patrol Officers act as the visible presence of the AAPD.


UNIFORM PATROL

The uniformed patrol section is responsible for 24/7 emergency and nonemergency response throughout the city of Ann Arbor. Officers are deployed on 12-hour shifts and are assigned to one of four geographical areas of the city. The patrol section is responsible for the enforcement of the criminal law, traffic law, and local ordinances.

K9 Stang in-service 11/17/22




K9 Roscoe in-service 06/30/22

AAPD currently has two police service dogs (PSD) in service. These teams are led by Officer Gregory Bergland (K-9 Roscoe) and Officer Thomas Burnette (K-9 Stang). PSDs are used to track criminal suspects from crime scenes, search buildings and other areas for hidden suspects, locate evidence or explosives, and search for lost or missing persons.





Station tours expose community members to our patrol division and our detective division to see the behind the scenes work that goes on within the AAPD. We also offer presentations to community members with topics of conversations can range from providing an understanding of our philosophy of service to our hiring/training practices. Safety Town is a program for young 5's, kindergarteners and first graders sponsored by the Ann Arbor Police Department and the Ann Arbor Recreation and Education Department (Rec & Ed), the program is designed to teach children about safety in a fun and interactive learning environment. The program includes classes such as: bike and vehicle safety, stranger safety, fire safety, pedestrian safety, and riding a school bus. Last year 563 children went through the program.



The Ann Arbor Police Department detective section investigates criminal activity occurring in the city of Ann Arbor. Detectives' responsibilities typically begin after the initial response and report. The detectives follow up to ensure a thorough investigation is completed and presented to the Washtenaw County Prosecutor or Ann Arbor City Attorney for warrant authorization and subsequent court proceeding



Lieutenant Bonnie Theil is the Commander of the Detective section.



District Detectives

The detective section is staffed by approximately 10 detectives. Many are assigned to one of two district detective groups. These groups investigate cases based on the geographical location of the incident. District detectives conduct investigations on a variety of crimes ranging from larceny and fraud to home invasion, robbery, and homicide. Some detectives have additional training or expertise in crime scene processing, polygraph, digital forensics, fraud, and domestic violence investigations. Sergeant Dawn Murphy, and Sergeant Chris Garrett, directly supervise the district detectives.

YEAR IN REVIEW



Winter 2023

- Chris Page becomes the first ever civilian Public Information Officer in AAPD history.
- Launch of the AAPD Instagram and YouTube social media pages.

Spring 2023

- Launch of the new AAPD transparency dashboard. The interactive dashboard allows community members to access crime statistics from the Ann Arbor Police Department in real time. The data includes calls for service, arrests, citations, traffic stops, and traffic crashes.
- May 20: AAPD Open House

Summer 2023

- Ann Arbor City Council unanimously passes Michigan's first driving equity ordinance. The new ordinance is immediately implemented by the AAPD.
- June 23-26: Second Annual "Blaze & Blue" Summer Camp
- Department adds new all-electric Polaris UTV to fleet. The UTV will be in use for every home U of M football game, as well as other large events held throughout the year.

Fall 2023

- Interim Chief Aimee Metzer retires after a 25-year career in the AAPD. I/Chief Metzer is the first woman to ever lead the department.
- Acting Deputy Chief Patrick Maguire is named Interim Chief of Police.
- City Council votes 10-0 on Dec. 18, to approve Andre Anderson as Ann Arbor's next chief of police.
