### LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Equity and justice are at the center of A²ZERO and staff in OSI are continuing to ground our work in these critical principles. In that light, we'd like to take a moment to honor the geographic and historic space we share. We acknowledge that the land the City of Ann Arbor occupies is the ancestral, traditional, and contemporary lands of the Anishinaabe and Wyandot peoples. We further acknowledge that our city stands, like almost all property in the United States, on lands obtained, generally in unconscionable ways, from indigenous peoples. The taking of this land was formalized by the Treaty of Detroit in 1807. Knowing where we live, work, study, and recreate does not change the past, but a thorough understanding of the ongoing consequences of this past can empower us in our work to create a future that supports human flourishing and justice for all individuals.

## A<sup>2</sup>ZERO AMBASSADOR PROGRAM

### VITAL COLLABORATORS IN ACHIEVING COMMUNITY-WIDE CARBON NEUTRALITY

For those wanting to get involved with sustainability and climate action, knowing where to start can be one of the most common obstacles. To address this barrier, the Office of Sustainability and Innovations (OSI) created the A<sup>2</sup>ZERO Ambassador program in 2020, a community-centered program that continues to grow and evolve with each cohort. The A<sup>2</sup>ZERO Ambassador program is a consecutive, 12-session training program that brings together cohorts of up to 25 community members to explore what it takes to equitably transition Ann Arbor to community-wide carbon neutrality by 2030.

Upon acceptance into the program, A<sup>2</sup>ZERO Ambassadors pledge to attend and engage in all 12 training sessions, as well as committing to uphold the values of A<sup>2</sup>ZERO and OSI. These 12 sessions mirror the A<sup>2</sup>ZERO plan and equip future Ambassadors with the knowledge and connections needed to serve

as extensions of OSI and trusted brokers of A<sup>2</sup>ZERO-related work.

Upon completion of their training, people in the program complete one of two project pathways to become an official A<sup>2</sup>ZERO Ambassador:

Pathway #1: Pledge to complete at least one outreach activity, such as giving a presentation to a group they are part of about a current Office of Sustainability and Innovations priority.

Pathway #2: Pledge to assist on a sustainability-related project with other members of their cohort supported by OSI staff or a community collaborator.

During their trainings, A<sup>2</sup>ZERO Ambassadors learn about a wide variety of topics such as principles of equity and environmental justice, climate change, renewable energy and efficiency, urban water systems, transportation and choices about

moving around the community, the circular economy, local food, community resilience and emergency preparedness, and how individuals can advance carbon neutrality!

While most of the training sessions are held in a hybrid format at Larcom City Hall (301 E Huron St, Ann Arbor, MI 48104) on Wednesday evenings from 6:30 – 8:30pm EDT, OSI also hosts training sessions at locations such as the water treatment plant, Ann Arbor Fire Stations, Argus Farm Stop, and the Bryant Community Center, among others. During training sessions, Ambassadors are joined by topic area experts and city staff working to advance sustainability and resilience in the community.

If you are looking to get involved in local climate action for the first time, rest assured there is no prior experience required to join the A<sup>2</sup>ZERO Ambassador program – only the desire and commitment to work collaboratively towards an equitable transition to community-wide carbon neutrality. Being a part of the Ambassador Program is also a great way to meet new people with varying life experiences and interests in sustainability. At OSI, we embrace the reality that achieving carbon neutrality will take a monumental collaborative effort that relies on the dedication of community members like the A<sup>2</sup>ZERO Ambassadors.

The Office of Sustainability and Innovations has officially trained 99 A<sup>2</sup>ZERO Ambassadors! With the graduation of the next cohort, OSI will achieve the goal of training 100 Ambassadors by the year 2025.

Our 6th cohort trainings will take place on the **following Wednesdays** from 6:30pm – 8:30pm EDT. While most trainings occur at Larcom City Hall with a hybrid component (301 E Huron St in Ann Arbor) some training sessions are at an alternate site.

## AMBASSADOR PROJECTS AND THE COMMUNITY

**TURNING TRAINING TO ACTION** 

As part of the program, Ambassadors can opt-in to assist on a sustainability-related project with other members of their cohort supported by Office of Sustainability and Innovations staff or community partners. Three new projects are highlighted below.



### THE GREEN ENERGY NEIGHBORS

Considering that all the options to reach carbon neutrality in your home can be daunting, wouldn't it be helpful to talk to a neighbor who has already made some of these changes? What if they could share their experiences with energy efficiency, electrification,

renewable energy adoptions, and lessons they learned along the way? Doing this and more is the goal of the Green Energy Neighbors.

Whether it's a home energy audit, energy recovery ventilator, electric appliance, heat pump, solar panel, storage batteries, electric vehicles and chargers, or even insulating your home, it can be a time-consuming and confusing process. It's also best to start this process well before you need to replace your existing system to give yourself the time to learn about new technologies, obtain quotes, and make

an informed decision. Getting connected with the Green Energy Neighbors, an Ambassador-led initiative, can give insight about someone's lived experience on a journey another resident is about to or interested in undertaking.

The Green Energy Neighbors mentoring network is a cost-free service to connect individuals considering energy efficiency improvements ("Learners") with people in the community who have already made some of these changes and can share their experiences ("Mentors").

Find the Green Energy Neighbors at their next tabling event by visiting the A<sup>2</sup>ZERO Ambassador webpage. As projects are completed, community members are welcome to apply to become a mentor to share stories and have an impact on our community!

#### COMMUNITY ORGANIZATION SUSTAINABILITY ADVISOR TEAM

Community-based organizations (CBO) often find themselves busy and at or over capacity. While an organization may have interest in integrating sustainability into their operations, making time to research and then implement changes often proves a challenge. That is where a group of dedicated Ambassadors come in! Tim Vaduva, Hannah Bernstein, Lynda Snider, and David Russel of The Community Organization Sustainability Ambassador team reach out to community-based organizations and gauge their interest in aspects of sustainability the organization would like to see implemented. From there, the Ambassadors work as a team to research the desired goals of the CBO and present them with options for moving the needle on their sustainability goals.

Ambassadors also enjoy occasional opportunities to get their hands dirty! Such was the case when they supported a rain garden installation at Genesis of Ann Arbor to relieve flooding issues on their grounds.

#### **NEIGHBORHOOD SWAP DAYS**

One A<sup>2</sup>ZERO Ambassador project team combined two goals – to engage in the practice of the circular economy and connect with neighbors – into one great project! Ambassadors Alexandria Galens (left), Husnu Kaplan (center), and Elaine Ezekiel (right) implemented Neighborhood Swap Days, which create opportunities for community members to come together and offer or exchange goods for free. Such items include clothes, books, décor, small appliances – anything one might find at a yard

sale. The project team organized two successful swap days in the Kerrytown and Foxfire Neighborhoods, bringing together approximately 40 households. Over 100 people visited and collected items, and all remaining items were donated to thrift stores.

Some of the participating households shared these thoughts about participating in the swap days: "Getting rid of things [that] I was no longer using by passing them on and not throwing them away. The amount of waste is so crazy and, most of the time, the items would be useful to someone else."

"We felt like we were helping our neighbors."

"I got to meet neighbors and get some nice free stuff. It was less stressful than planning and setting up a yard sale. It was also great that remaining items were picked up at the end of the event."

"It was so easy. We didn't have to figure out which organization is open for donations when, and if they take everything except kid's toys, etc. We put our items out, many were picked up by people during the swap hours and the remainder were collected by volunteers."

"It was nice to see our neighbors again."

# WHAT'S IT LIKE? TESTIMONIALS FROM PREVIOUS AMBASSADORS



The biggest thing I took away from the Ambassadors program was the huge diversity of what sustainability can look like. Recycling and clean energy immediately come to mind, but sustainability can also be better food access, a more bikeable city, and stronger community ties. And I got to see examples of how all this work on sustainability can help address racial and social inequities as a part of a local, just transition. With so many people that are passionate about all these different aspects of sustainability, I loved learning how everyone I met through the program looks at addressing climate change.

I first heard about the A<sup>2</sup>ZERO Ambassador program at the beginning of high school from a fellow classmate. What attracted me to the Ambassador program was its approachability: it assumes no significant prior knowledge, just curiosity. The main thing that surprised me about going through the program was the diversity, in age and background, of the participants in my cohort. Their differences in perspective provided a richness to the experience that couldn't be achieved on its own.

I also found the process of completing an ambassador project extremely rewarding because of the hands-on nature of it. I was part of the team that started the Plant-Based Challenge, working on the sustainable food aspect of the A<sup>2</sup>ZERO plan. The support we received from OSI staff and our nonprofit partner, VegMichigan, was crucial to our success. Taking initiative to solve a real issue that I saw in my community engendered a sense of ownership over climate change, but also a sense of hope.

Overall, I highly recommend this program for people of all ages, but especially for high school and college students. The Ambassador program gives you the knowledge and skillset to enact change within your community while also connecting you with like-minded people that you would have never been able to meet otherwise.
