Ann Arbor Launches Open Data Portal. City of Ann Arbor data is now available to the public like never before, in the forms of charts, graphs and maps, at <https://data.a2gov.org/>. The launch of the new Ann Arbor Open Data Portal is in response to [City Council Resolution R-23-331](#), “Resolution to Improve Data Transparency and Performance Management.” The Ann Arbor Open Data Portal provides a central location for all the varied city data products. Users can search by specific keywords or browse by topic, tag or format. The portal hosts performance indicators and data across a variety of topics, including: rainfall measurements at city-operated rain gauges; drinking water quality; a real-time snowplowing map; progress toward A2ZERO goals; pavement conditions and planned road improvements; traffic crashes; and much more.

Ann Arbor Police Department Launches New Transparency Dashboard. The Ann Arbor Police Department has launched The Official Ann Arbor Police Department Public Dashboard, a new online transparency dashboard designed to give community members easier access to up-to-date crime data and information. The interactive resource allows users to explore crime trends citywide, downtown, and by ward.

The AAPD dashboard is updated weekly to show information about criminal incidents reported to the department, providing community members with the most current view of local public safety activity. The dashboard includes data dating back to 2021, allowing users to view trends over time and analyze patterns by day of the week and hour of the day.

The latest data shows that overall crime in Ann Arbor is down 8% citywide so far this year, with violent crime down 4% citywide.

In addition to the new dashboard, Chief Anderson will also begin hosting a series of “Chief’s Community Chats” across the city, providing community members with the opportunity to share what’s on their minds and engage directly with police leadership. AAPD will also hold quarterly “CompStat” meetings open to the public, offering a closer look at crime trends and ongoing efforts to keep the community safe. Follow AAPD on social media to stay informed of when these opportunities will take place.

The transparency dashboard represents AAPD's ongoing commitment to accountability, innovation, and open communication with those we serve. Community members can access the dashboard on the City of Ann Arbor website at <https://annarborpolice.org/dashboard>.

City residents can also submit a voter registration form by mail, email, fax or in-person at the [Ann Arbor City Clerk's office](#).
- The Ann Arbor City Clerk's office will have extended office hours leading up to Election Day.
 - Wednesday, Oct. 29–Friday, Oct. 31: 8 a.m.–7 p.m.
 - Saturday, Nov. 1: 9 a.m.–7 p.m.
 - Sunday, Nov. 2: 9 a.m.–7 p.m.
 - Election Day, Tuesday, Nov. 4: 7 a.m.–8 p.m.
- For voters not wanting to wait for Election Day to cast their ballot, [early voting](#) will again be open daily at four sites in the city Wednesday, Oct. 29, through Sunday, Nov. 2 — **Larcom City Hall**, 9 a.m.–5 p.m. | **Traverwood Library Branch**, 11 a.m.–7 p.m. | **Malletts Creek Library Branch**, 11 a.m.–7 p.m. | **Westgate Library Branch**, 11 a.m.–7 p.m.

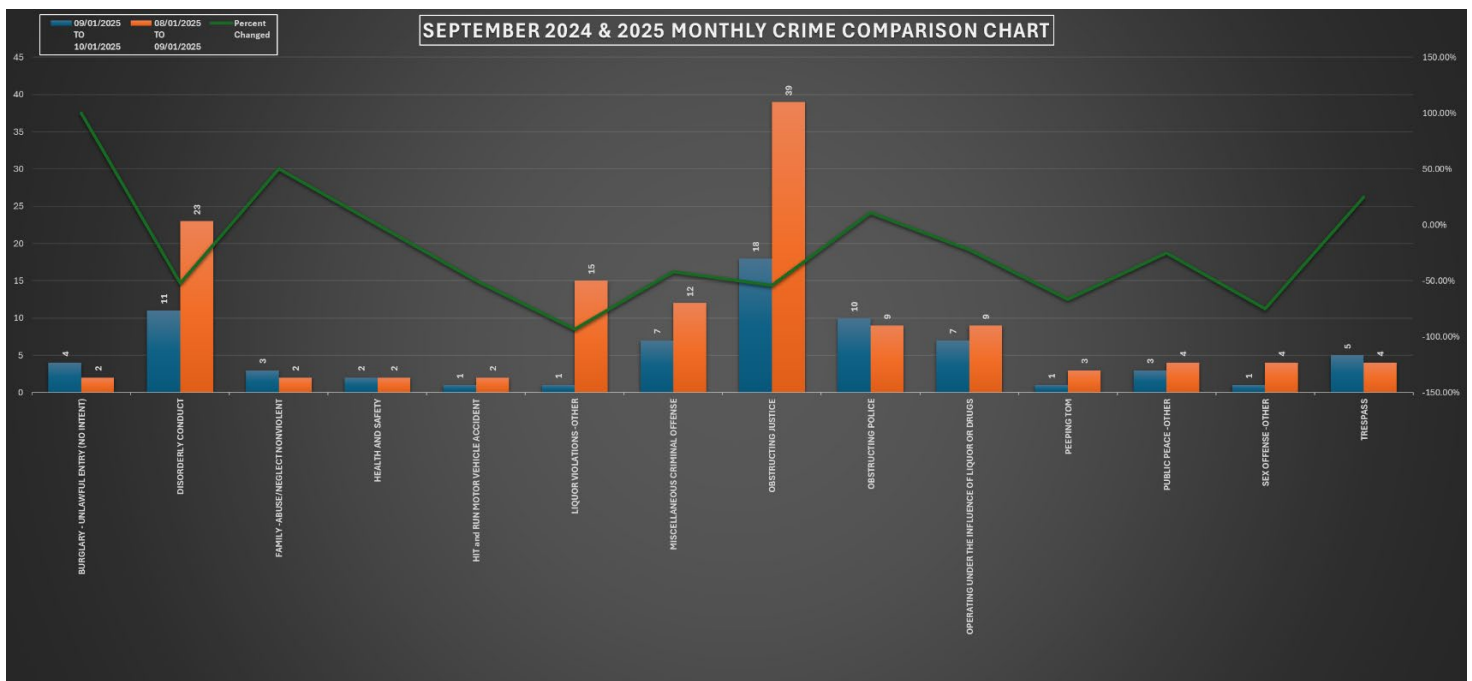

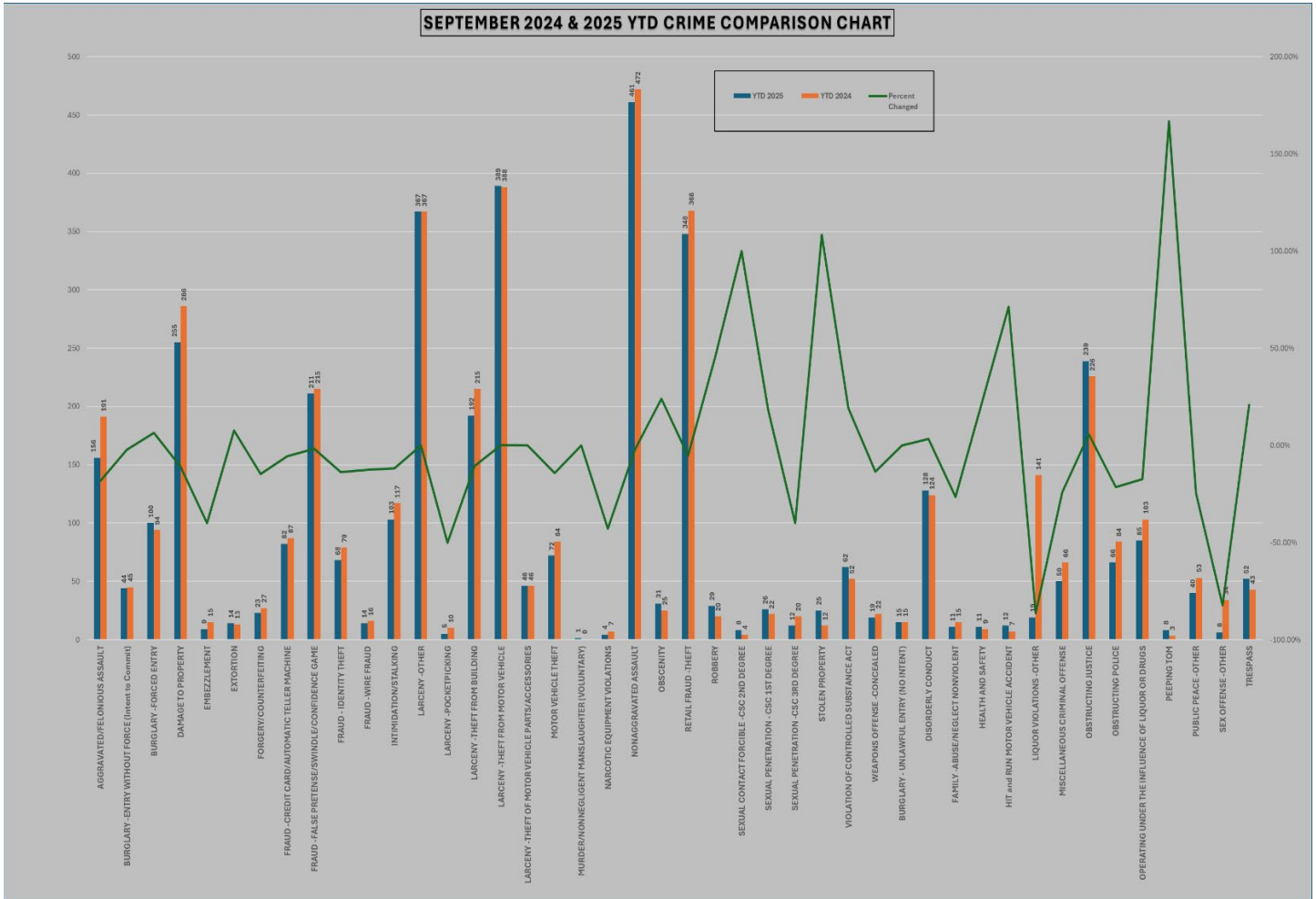
