Safety Update Radon

January is National Radon Action month. Radon is tasteless, colorless, and odorless radioactive gas that is found in all types of soil and rock and is prevalent in SE Michigan. Radon gas can seep into homes through cracks in foundations, around floor drains and sump pumps. Long-term exposure to elevated levels of radon indoors can cause lung cancer, so it is important that every home be tested for radon. Washtenaw County recently announced that residents can pick up a discounted radon test kit for \$5 through the end of January. For more information, please visit the Washtenaw County [website](#). - **Expression of Interest: Public Electric Vehicle Charging.** Multi-family and commercial sites interested in hosting electric vehicle chargers are encouraged to review the expression of interest recently released by The Office of Sustainability and Innovations. The Office is able to provide up to 90% of the funding to install publicly accessible chargers thanks to a Charging and Fueling Infrastructure grant the City won in 2025. - **A²ZERO Home Energy Advisor hits milestone, helping over 500 Ann Arbor households.** Over 500 Ann Arbor homes have now received customized plans for advancing sustainability, energy efficiency and health through the City's A²ZERO Home Energy Advisor (HEA). - **City of Ann Arbor's Green Rental Housing Ordinance Went into Effect Jan 6, 2026.** The Green Rental Housing Ordinance requires every rental unit in Ann Arbor to meet a minimum baseline of safety, comfort, and energy efficiency at the time of its rental inspection. - **A²ZERO Ambassador Applications Now Open!** The A²ZERO Ambassador Program is a 12-session training program that hosts community members to explore pathways for advancing local sustainability

Winter Compost Pickup. The city is performing once-monthly pickup of compost carts throughout the winter, however no bags or bundles will be collected. Remaining monthly curbside compost cart pickups will take place during the weeks of Feb. 2 and March 2, 2026. Carts will be collected on residents' regular solid waste collection day.

A2 Snow Match Snow-covered sidewalks can be hazardous for everyone. But there's something you can do for your neighbors, on either side of the snowbank: [Sign up for the A2 Snow Match program, by becoming a volunteer OR, if eligible, receiving snow/ice-removal assistance](#)



to keep walkways passable. The A2 Snow Match program pairs residents in need with nearby neighbors who volunteer to assist with snow removal.

Recipients of volunteer services must be city residents age 55+ or self-identify as having a disability, and without other resources available to help with snow removal (i.e., financial, family, friends or neighbors).
