Safety Update A2 Snow Match

Become a volunteer in the City of Ann Arbor OR receive shoveling services. Snow-covered sidewalks can be hazardous for everyone. The A2 Snow Match program helps keep sidewalks accessible for all ages and abilities by pairing residents with nearby neighbors who volunteer to assist with snow removal. Recipients of volunteer services must be City residents age 55+ or self-identify as having a disability, and not have other resources (financial, family, friends or neighbors) available to help with snow removal. Volunteers are matched with homes within about a 10-minute walk of their location. Residents can register to volunteer or receive services!

- **Business Rebates for Electric Leaf Blowers** – [Business rebates for electric leaf blowers have been reinstated](#) through September 30, 2026, or until funding is expended. Designed to help lower the cost of transitioning from gas to electric leaf blowers in accordance with Ann Arbor's leaf blower ordinance, these rebates will be available to businesses that provide lawn care or landscaping services to properties located in Ann Arbor.
- **Ann Arbor City Council Votes Unanimously to Accept \$11 Million for District Geothermal System** -- Ann Arbor City Council on October 7, 2025, voted unanimously to accept nearly \$11 million (\$10,788,167) from the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) to implement a district-scale geothermal heating and cooling system in the Bryant neighborhood. - **Ann Arbor Awarded \$250,000 Grant to Advance Sustainable Energy Utility** -- The City of Ann Arbor has been selected to receive a \$250,000 grant from the Municipal Investment Fund (MIF) to advance its newly created Sustainable Energy Utility. The City of Ann Arbor will use the MIF grant to prepare an operational plan and financial strategy to launch a newly created, innovative and renewable energy-centered Sustainable Energy Utility (SEU) that accelerates the city's clean energy transformation while
