

# Project History

2013	Residents report deer damaging landscape, causing vehicle accidents (Arbor Hills & Green Road/Glazier Way)
May 5, 2014	Council resolution to evaluate deer management options
August 2014	Staff delivers report: <i>Deer Management Options</i>
Aug. 14, 2014	Council authorizes development of community endorsed Deer Management Plan with Public Engagement
Oct. 2014	After competitive process, Project Innovations is awarded public engagement contract (\$19,860)







## 1. Do we have a deer problem?






# Car Accident Data


## January 1, 2011 - November 4, 2014

# Songbird Counts in Ann Arbor Parks










