Service Animals and Pets

Service animals and pets are vital members of our lives and should always be included in emergency preparedness plans to ensure their safety and well-being. Since most public shelters only allow service animals, it's important to have a plan for your pets during an emergency.

Just like people, animals need emergency kits. Consider preparing two: a larger kit for sheltering in place and a smaller, portable kit for evacuation. Here are some essential items to include:

Food. Keep several days' supply of food in an airtight, waterproof container Water. Store a water bowl and	Grooming Supplies. Have pet shampoo, wipes, and other items in case your pet needs cleaning up
several days' supply of water	Sanitation Needs. Have litter and litter box (if needed),
Medicine . Keep an extra supply of any medicine your pet needs	newspaper, paper towels, towels, trash bags, and pet-safe
First Aid Kit . Consider purchasing a pet-specific first	cleaning supplies to provide for your pets' sanitation needs

Carrier. Have a travel carrier or crate, ideally one for each pet	can help reduce their stress during emergencies
ID, Leash, & Collar. Have a backup leash, collar, and ID tag in case these items are not readily available when disaster strikes	Photo. Have a picture of you and your pet together. In the event you get separated, this can help prove ownership and identification
