- **Ken Winter is February's Climate Action Hero**, recognized for his work in his own neighborhood to organize and co-create a vibrant multigenerational cohousing community – culturally, economically, and racially diverse – which seeks to form regenerative relationships with one another and with nature, and move to carbon neutrality! Residents are encouraged to submit Climate Action Heroes from their community at osi.a2gov.org/hero.
- **TONIGHT -- Monthly Clothing Swap, Thursday, Feb. 19, 4-7 PM, City Hall:** Join the Office of Sustainability and Innovations for monthly clothing swaps on the third Thursday of each month! These are a perfect way to give your gently used clothes a new home. And you might just find an item of clothing you have been looking for, without having to buy it new.
- **The application deadline for snow shovels and electric snow blower rebates has been extended to Feb. 28.** Ann Arbor residents can receive up to \$200 in rebate funds for a new electric snow blower or shovel. - The first host of landlords have come into compliance with the Green Rental Housing Ordinance which went into effect on January 6, 2026, taking advantage both of the Home Energy Rating System (HERS) pathway and the checklist pathway. This ordinance ensures a minimum baseline of safety, efficiency,

- **A²ZERO Community Cookbook Giveaway:** The A²ZERO Community Cookbook features over 70 climate-friendly recipes shared by Ann Arbor community members and is now available online and in limited print copies. - **Peace Neighborhood Center has officially completed a \$98,000 LED retrofit and lighting controls project, funded by the Community Climate Action Millage**, in partnership with OSI, as one of our community's designated Resilience Hubs. This retrofit has installed motion-sensor lights and a lighting control system, which will save Peace thousands of dollars in lighting costs over the system's lifespan.
- **Sustainability Forum, Tuesday, Feb. 24, 6 PM, AADL Downtown Branch:** Join Ann Arbor's Office of Sustainability and Innovations for the second session of the 2026 Sustainability Forums to explore how the City weaves sustainability into its municipal operations. Winter Compost Pickup. The city is performing once-monthly pickup of compost carts throughout the winter, however no bags or bundles will be collected. The remaining monthly curbside compost cart pickup will take place during the week of March 2, 2026. Carts will be collected on residents' regular solid waste collection day.

Ann Arbor Seeks Artist to Create Bronze Statue Honoring LGBTQ+ Trailblazer Kathy Kozachenko. The City of Ann Arbor is inviting experienced bronze artists and artist teams to apply to design, fabricate and install a life-sized bronze figure honoring Kathy Kozachenko, the first openly LGBTQ+ person elected to public office in the United States. The sculpture will be installed in front of Larcom City Hall, 301 E. Huron St.

The artist call is being managed by the [Ann Arbor Art Center](#) in collaboration with the City of Ann Arbor. The selected artist or team will create a permanent work recognizing Kozachenko's historic election to the Ann Arbor City Council in 1974 and her lasting impact on civil rights and public service. The total budget for the project is \$75,000.

Project timeline:

- Call submission deadline: March 8 at 11:59 p.m.
- Semi-finalists selected: April
- Semi-finalists interviews: May
- Finalist awarded: June
- Project completion and installation: Spring/Summer 2027

A2 Snow Match Snow-covered sidewalks can be hazardous for everyone. But there's something you can do for your neighbors, on either side of the snowbank: [Sign up for the A2 Snow Match program, by becoming a volunteer OR, if eligible, receiving snow/ice-removal assistance](#) to keep walkways passable. The A2 Snow Match program pairs residents in need with nearby neighbors who volunteer to assist with snow removal.



Recipients of volunteer services must be city residents age 55+ or self-identify as having a disability, and without other resources available to help with snow removal (i.e., financial, family, friends or neighbors). Volunteers are matched with
