

UNIFORM PATROL


The uniformed patrol section is responsible for 24/7 emergency and nonemergency response throughout the city of Ann Arbor. Officers are deployed on 12-hour shifts and are assigned to one of four geographical areas of the city. The patrol section is responsible for the enforcement of the criminal law, traffic law, and local ordinances.



AAPD currently has two police service dogs (PSD) in service. These teams are led by Officer Gregory Bergland (K-9 Roscoe) and Officer Thomas Burnette (K-9 Stang). PSDs are used to track criminal suspects from crime scenes, search buildings and other areas for hidden suspects, locate evidence or drugs and search for lost or missing persons.

DETECTIVE SECTION



The Ann Arbor Police Department detective section investigates criminal activity occurring in the city of Ann Arbor. Detectives' responsibilities typically begin after the initial response and report. The detectives follow up to ensure a thorough investigation is completed and presented to the Washtenaw County Prosecutor or Ann Arbor City Attorney for warrant authorization and subsequent court proceeding


District Detectives

The detective section is staffed by approximately 10 detectives. Many are assigned to one of two district detective groups. These groups investigate cases based on the geographical location of the incident. District detectives conduct investigations on a variety of crimes ranging from larceny and fraud to home invasion, robbery, and homicide. Some detectives have additional training or expertise in crime scene processing, polygraph, digital forensics, fraud, and domestic violence investigations. Sergeant Dawn Murphy, and Sergeant Chris Garrett, directly supervise the district detectives.

LAWNET

The Livingston and Washtenaw Narcotics Enforcement Team (LAWNET) is a regional drug enforcement task force with participation from member law enforcement agencies in Washtenaw and Livingston counties as well as the Michigan State Police. 



Station tours expose community members to our patrol division and our detective division to see the behind the scenes work that goes on within the AAPD. We also offer presentations to community members with topics of conversations can range from providing an understanding of our philosophy of service to our hiring/training practices. AAPD encourages community members to ride a long with officers during the performance of their daily duties. Ride alongs allow you to “partner” with a police officer and learn how we respond to calls. Lieutenant John Dunlap led the Professional Standards section.





AUDIT AND REVIEW SECTION







SPECIAL SERVICES SECTION

WHAT'S NEW?

Winter 2022

- Reorganization within the AAPD. Changes within the department include a new section called the Community Outreach and Problem Solving Section. This section includes the Community Engagement Unit and the newly created Problem Impact Team.
- Administrative Services Section renamed to Professional Development, which oversees hiring, recruiting, and training, as well as property and records.
- Launch of the AAPD Instagram and YouTube social media pages.
- In partnership with Ann Arbor Public Schools and Huron Valley Ambulance, AAPD officers help train more than 250 district employees in adult CPR, pediatric CPR, use of AED, and how to stop traumatic bleeding.

Spring 2023

- Launch of the new AAPD transparency dashboard.
- The dashboard will make available to the public the number of calls for service, citations, arrests, and traffic crashes.
- May 20: AAPD Open House

Summer 2023

- AAPD, in partnership with Ann Arbor Public Schools, officers will undergo increased training that includes threat response to AAPS schools.
- June 23-26: Second Annual "Blaze & Blue" Summer Camp



In January 2023, the AAPD welcomed Chris Page as the department's new Public Information Officer. PIO Page is a Western Michigan University graduate and joins the AAPD after a 12-year career in broadcast journalism, where he worked for WDIV-TV in Detroit and WKMG-TV in Orlando.
