# OUTDOOR LIGHTING ORDINANCE City of Ann Arbor

## WHY A LIGHTING ORDINANCE?

While outdoor lighting serves a purpose, it also has negative impacts: light trespass onto neighboring properties; health and safety problems due to glare and skyglow; serious environmental impacts; and wasted energy.



#### THESE REGULATIONS APPLY TO ALL PRIVATE PROPERTIES


# LIGHT TRESPASS

Outdoor lighting can only spread minimally beyond the target sign or building, or onto a neighbor's property.



## FULLY/PARTIALLY SHIELDED

All new luminaires must be fully or partially shielded, per the new ordinance. Full shielding does not emit light above a horizontal plane drawn through their lowest lightemitting part. Partial shielding allows some light above the horizontal plane, in order to illuminate a specific upright target (like a statue or wall sign).



### LIGHTS OFF FROM MIDNIGHT TO 6AM

Decorative lighting of building facades and landscape must be turned off between midnight and 6:00am (except during business hours in non-residential districts).

# **PARKING LOTS**

Lighting on parking lots must be fully shielded

Lighting on sites with no residential uses must be extinguished within a half hour of close of business.


See the ordinance for maximum light levels.

#### NO MOVING NO CHANGING NO FLASHING LIGHTS ALLOWED

Except temporary lighting in residential zoning districts.

# **EXCEPTIONS**

- Temporary lighting, like holiday and special event lighting, is allowed for 90 consecutive days per year. It must be turned off between midnight and 6am.
- Lighting for flags.
- Light installations determined by the Historic District Commission to contribute to the historic character of a property.









# REQUIREMENTS

Outdoor lighting must use colors no bluer than "warm white" (Correlated Color Temperature no greater than 3000 K); and must approximate a natural light source (Color Rendering Index of at least 70).

This does not apply to single- and twofamily properties or illuminated signs.
