

Please provide the following guidelines to victims of IRS identity theft complaints:

- 1. Fill out IRS Identity Theft Affidavit Form 14039 and follow the instructions on the back.
- 2. File a report with the Federal Trade Commission www.identitytheft.gov or FTC Identity Theft Hotline at 1.877.438.4338.
- 3. Contact the Social Security Administration Fraud Hotline at 1.800.269.0271.
- 4. Contact and report the incident to the fraud departments of the three major credit reporting agencies.

Contact information for the Credit Reporting Agencies:

Victims are advised to contact the below listed credit reporting agencies to place an alert on their name. Additionally, the victim should obtain/review their credit report to ensure that no other crimes have occurred utilizing their identity.
