Introduction

A. Task Force mission from the City Council resolution R-13-367: The Task Force will explore strategies to improve pedestrian safety and access within a framework of shared responsibility through community outreach and data collection, and will recommend to Council improvements in the development and application of the Complete Streets model, using best practices, sound data and objective analysis; the task force will also address sidewalk gaps and create a tool for setting priorities for funding and filling those gaps; the task force will also recommend whether pedestrian safety and access should be the focus of ongoing community scrutiny through the establishment of a standing committee on pedestrian safety;

The Task Force's role was to review the City's existing vision, goals and objectives and determine if they sufficiently address reducing the number of pedestrian crashes as well as increasing the number of pedestrian trips.

From a broad view, a Pedestrian Safety Action Plan is nested under the City's Non-motorized Transportation Plan, Transportation Master Plan and Complete Streets Resolution. The vision, goals and objectives from the City of Ann Arbor 2013 Non-motorized Plan were reviewed by the Task Force, as these focus specifically on pedestrian and bicycle transportation in the City. 
Significant to both Sidewalk Winter Maintenance and Sidewalk Gaps

A2 Fix It Tool

- Report non-emergency problems in City of Ann Arbor via smartphone, tablet or computer
- This will be the first winter with the A2 Fix It tool which will change reporting and issues resolution
- Resource Group noted that this new tool has the potential to address many of the concerns that came up last winter
- Potential for the Task Force to test out this new tool, promote its use and provide feedback

Current Policies:

Chapter 49 SIDEWALKS 4:60—Snow and Ice

All snow and ice which has accumulated prior to 6:00 a.m. on a public sidewalk adjacent to property not zoned residentially shall be removed by the owner or occupant by noon. Immediately after the accumulation of ice on such sidewalk it shall be treated with sand, salt or other substance to prevent it from being slippery and the ice shall be removed within the time limits of this paragraph.

Except for sidewalks defined by section 4:51(1)(b) and (c)*, within 24 hours after the end of each accumulation of snow greater than 1 inch, the owner or occupant of every residentially zoned property shall remove the accumulation from the adjacent public sidewalk and walks and ramps leading to a crosswalk. The accumulation may be from any source including precipitation and drifting. Immediately after the accumulation of ice on such sidewalk, it shall be treated with sand, salt or other substance to prevent it from being slippery and the ice shall be removed within 24 hours after accumulation.

All property zoned PL (public land) shall have snow and ice removed as if it held the same zoning classification as the adjacent property. The removal of snow and ice shall mean free of snow and ice for the entire constructed width and length of the sidewalk, including walks and ramps leading to a crosswalk.

*Note: 4:51(1)(b) and (c)

"Sidewalk" shall mean any concrete or bituminous walkway, or walkway of other materials that is designed particularly for pedestrian, bicycle, or other non-motorized travel and that is constructed (a) in a public right-of-way that contains an improved street or in an easement adjacent and parallel to a public right-of-way that contains an improved street, (b) in a public right-of-way without an improved street, or (c) within or upon an easement or strip of land that is not adjacent and parallel to a public right-of-way, and that was taken or accepted by the city or dedicated to and accepted by the city for public use by pedestrians, bicycles, or other non-motorized travel. As used in this chapter, "sidewalk" includes walks and ramps leading to a crosswalk.



Enforcement

Chapter 49 SIDEWALKS 4:61—Removal by City

If snow or ice is not removed or treated as required section 4:60, the city may notify the owner or occupant of the violation of section 4:60. This notification may be made in person, by telephone, by mail or by written notice left at the property. If the owner or occupant fails to remove snow or ice within 24 hours of the notification of violation of section 4:60, the city may cause such snow or ice to be removed. The owner (as indicated by the records of the assessor) of the adjacent property shall then be charged the actual cost of the sidewalk clearance, plus an administrative fee of \$50.00. If that charge is not paid within 45 days, it may be assessed against the parcel under section 1:292 of this Code

Chapter 49 SIDEWALKS 4:62—Finanacial Hardship

Upon proof of financial hardship the Administrator may authorize charges under section 4:61 to be paid in installments, to be reduced, or to be cancelled and will be subject to Council approval.

Chapter 49 SIDEWALKS 4:63—Penalty

The owner (as shown on the assessor's records) of the property with adjacent sidewalks which do not comply with section 4:60, who fails to comply with the notice given in section 4:61, shall be responsible for a civil infraction, which shall be punishable by a civil fine of not less than \$100.00 for the first offense, not less than \$250.00 and up to \$500.00 for the second offense, and not less than \$500.00 and up to \$1,000.00 for each additional or subsequent offense within a 2-year time period, plus costs and all other remedies available by statute.. The maximum fine for any offense shall not exceed \$1,000.00. If the penalty is not paid within 45 days, it may be assessed against the parcel under section 1:292 of this Code.



Available Data:

Community Standards has collected and reported sidewalk snow enforcement data from December 2011 through March 2014. In the chart, the reference to "Total Time Code Enforcement" in any given month references the aggregate time spent on all code enforcement reports; such as, solid waste, parking, vegetation, and other ordinances enforced by Community Standards.

Available Community Reporting Methods:

If any citizen has a concern regarding sidewalk snow removal 24 hours after the end of an accumulation greater than one inch, citizens may call Community Standards at 734.794.6942 (Monday—Friday, 7 a.m.—3:30 p.m.) to report locations which may be in violation of the city snow removal ordinance. When calling, citizens should be prepared to leave their name and number in case staff requires additional information. Caller's names and numbers are kept in strict confidence, and are only used to process service requests.

Citizens can also use the <u>Report A Problem</u> application on the City website to make a report about sidewalk snow removal.

Upon reports of non-compliance, Community Standards will perform an inspection of the reported address. If the inspection reveals a violation, we will then inspect all addresses within the "100 block" (i.e., addresses 100 numbers apart such as 2300 to 2400) to ensure equitable treatment. Each address in violation will receive a "Sidewalk Snow Removal Notice," which is posted on the front door of the property.

 - What is the definition of a sidewalk gap?
 - What are the City's plans to address sidewalk gaps along primary roads, local roads, entire neighborhoods and on parcels concurrent with new development/ redevelopment?



7b. Sidewalk Gaps

Current Policies:

Pending the recommendations of this Task Force, the City has an informal interim policy for how citizen initiated sidewalk gap petitions will be addressed. The flow-chart for this is attached.


Under the City Complete Streets policy, City road reconstruction projects also include the filling in of sidewalk gaps along the project route.

Citizens are generally assessed for filling of those gaps which touch their front yards and side yards, but not their rear yards.

By City Code, Chapter 49, Sidewalks, Section 4:56, the City can order the filling of a sidewalk gap. This process has not, however, been heavily invoked. The text reads:

The City Council may, by resolution require the owners of lots and premises to construct, rebuild or repair sidewalks in the public right-of-way adjacent to and abutting upon such lots and premises, and shall specify in said resolution the material to be used for said sidewalks. When any such resolution is adopted, it shall be the duty of the city clerk to cause a notice of the same to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the city in at least 2 issues thereof and on successive publishing days, directed to the owner or owners of the lots and premises, without naming him or them, in front of and adjacent to which said sidewalk is to be constructed, rebuilt or repaired, requiring such owner or owners to construct, rebuild or repair, as the case may be, such sidewalk as is required by such resolution, within 10 days from the date of the last publication of the notice, unless a different time shall be specified in the resolution of the City Council, and, if specified by Council, requiring said owner or owners to notify the city by a given date as to whether said improvements will be made by said owner or owners.

7b. Sidewalk Gaps

Available Data:

The City has inventoried and mapped in its GIS application all properties which do not have sidewalks along their adjacent public road frontage (s). A copy of an overview map is attached.

In May, 2013, the inventory showed 2,239,674 lineal feet of existing sidewalks and 851,726 lineal feet of sidewalk "gaps." It is noted that these "gaps" include entire neighborhoods without sidewalks and not just short missing segments. Since that time, gaps were filled as part of several City projects including, as an example, nearly 2000 lineal feet of new sidewalks along Miller Avenue.

Staff have also performed some basic benchmark research on the issue and particularly note the very thorough Sidewalk Master Plan developed by the City of Austin, TX (see attached).

Available Community Reporting Methods:


Citizens can use the <u>Report A Problem</u> application on the City website to report a sidewalk in need of repair or a missing sidewalk.

The <u>New Sidewalks FAQ</u> page on the City website also gives citizens a mechanism for petitioning for sidewalks to be installed.

Citizens may also request a project to be considered for inclusion in the Capital Improvement Program ("CIP") by making a request directly to the Systems Planning Unit or by voicing a request at the public hearing which occurs each year when the Planning Commission considers the CIP for approval.

Any recommended policies on the subject included in adopted plans?

<u>The City of Ann Arbor Non-motorized Transportation Plan Update 2013</u> identifies Near-Term and Long-Term Opportunities including for installation of new sidewalks (see pages 160-177) as well as policy statements regarding installation of sidewalks.

Any ideas currently being discussed by City Staff?

An internal staff group began the process of addressing the issue of sidewalk gaps prior to formation of this task force. Initial efforts included creation of the gap inventory, identification of key issues such as need for a detailed funding source analysis, community engagement, need to consider an opt-out process for neighborhoods with no sidewalks, and the need to develop a prioritization model that reflects community values.
